AFTERNOON SESSION CONDUCTED BY EDUCATORS FOR SOCIAL RESPONSIBILITY

"Teaching about Peace" Students have trouble envisioning a warfree future. While war is often portrayed as heroic and powerful, peace is seen as passive and boring. Using a variety of resources, participants will learn how to teach about peace rather than war. Gene Thompson, author and Professional Development Coordinator for ESR will conduct this session geared to secondary classrooms.

"The Peaceable Classroom" What is developmentally appropriate nuclear age education at the elementary level? How do we respond to children's concerns without increasing fears or creating new ones? How can teachers create a "peaceable classroom"? Susan Jones, fourth grade teacher and author, will conduct this session geared to elementary classrooms.
